Tornado, Storm, and Flood Preparedness

It is spring storm season in Nebraska, and with that comes a risk of tornadoes and floods. Tornadoes can strike quickly and with little warning, while floods are one of the most common disasters in the United States. According to the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), 98 percent of all counties in the U.S. have experienced flooding at some time. Both tornadoes and floods can result in fatalities, as well as injuries, property damage, physical health issues, behavioral health problems, and economic hardship, and can involve long recovery periods.

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) produces guides with resources on coping and behavioral health issues after various disasters, including <u>tornadoes</u> and <u>floods</u>.

The National Child Traumatic Stress Network produces resources on the behavioral health needs of children after <u>tornadoes</u> and <u>floods</u>.

The American Red Cross provides information on recovery tips for all types of natural disasters.

Several organizations provide flood preparedness guidance. It is particularly important that responders be prepared so they are available to respond when needed.

- Ready.gov provides multiple tips on preparedness and safety, as well as actions to take after a tornado or flood.
- Similar guides from the American Red Cross also include information on how to keep pets and livestock safe during <u>tornadoes</u> and <u>floods</u>.

School Violence Resources

Recent high-profile school shootings call attention to the need for awareness about school violence prevention. School violence can also include more common problems such as bullying and physical fighting between students.

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) supplies resources on reducing school violence, increasing school safety, and promoting access to mental health services for students. You can access these resources here.

New NCTSN Resource: Supporting Children with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities Who Have Experienced Trauma

The National Child Traumatic Stress Network (NCTSN) has developed a training to provide tools and skills for working with children living with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD) who have experienced trauma, and their families. Training materials available include a Facilitator Guide and a Participant Manual. Service providers can use knowledge gained through the training to support children's safety, well-being, happiness, and recovery through trauma-informed practice.
