Ethical Considerations #13 Safety

- Crisis counselors should always attempt to <u>assess</u> <u>safety prior to and during work</u> in disaster settings.
- Crisis counselors should ensure that encounters take place in safe, secure, and comfortable settings.
- The <u>safety of crisis counselors</u> should <u>always</u> be a CCP <u>priority</u>.



What do we mean by Remember?








- Mind is a set of operations carried out by the brain







Ethical Considerations Confidentiality

BUT THERE ARE LIMITS TO THIS PLEDGE ...

- →Follow state & local reporting regulations:
 - > in cases of suicidal or homicidal intent (#2).
 - > mandatory reporting for child or elder abuse and neglect (#3).

What is said in the room stays in the room except for disclosure of:

a) imminent threat of violence to self/others.

Know your Regional Behavioral Health Authority's policy and procedures about managing someone who is <u>Dangerousness Due to Mental Illness or Substance Dependence.</u>
